Across the whole school our Pupil premium children achieved:

Reading: 73% of the children have made at least good progress and 23% accelerated progress

Writing: 79% have made at least good progress and 19% accelerated progress

Maths: 71% have made at least good progress and 10% accelerated progress

Attendance

Prior to Covid-19 the attendance figure for our Pupil premium children was improving. In 2016-2017 the figure was 92.5%. By 2019-2020 this had improved to 94.3% Covid has continued to impact of attendance since 2020. Our Current % for PP children is 88% compared with 93% for non-PP families
